Minutes

1. Situation update

- Humanitarian workers are beginning to access the areas most affected by the earthquake. Initial inter-sector
 planning shows that close to 500,000 people are in need of humanitarian assistance across the three regions
 affected. These figures are being reviewed by humanitarians working on the Flash Appeal.
- NetHope shared a map prepared by Crisis Ready and Direct Relief showing connectivity after the Earthquake
 based on facebook data. The maps showed partial connectivity loss in large parts of the department of Les
 Nippes and in southwestern coastal areas immediately after the earthquake. By 17 August, the map shows
 that most of Les Nippes has regained connectivity, while the lack of connectivity increased in the western
 regions, perhaps due to storm impacts, aftershocks, and/or power outages.
- Some community radios are reported to have sustained significant damage. The radio station in Petit Trou
 de Nippes is still up and running.

Coordination

- A Flash Appeal is being prepared for the Haiti earthquake.
- World Food Programme (WFP) FITTEST Specialist Lasse Axelsson arrived in Haiti to conduct a
 telecommunications assessment and support Patrick Midy, WFP Haiti Head of TEC with initial interagency
 coordination. They will visit the National Centre for Emergency Operations (COUN) today to meet other
 partners and determine the next steps on telecommunications, connectivity, and ICT-related aspects of the
 response. After the visit to the COUN, a meeting is planned with the UN Department for Safety and Security
 (UNDSS).
- WFP is planning to send another staff member to support the increased need for inter-agency coordination
 on the ground with more staff being mobilized to respond to the emergency. . Partners are encouraged to
 share the names and contact details of personnel deploying to Haiti with the Global ETC for inclusion in
 local contact lists.

Security & Logistics

• It is not safe to drive from Port-au-Prince to the affected area, as the route crosses through areas controlled by non-state armed groups, most notably Matisan. There have been some reports of trucks being looted. There have also been reports of the local population blocking roads to try to get aid. However, there is no known presence of these groups in the actual affected area.



- The Logistics Sector, led by WFP, has negotiated a temporary agreement with some of the non-state armed groups to allow trucks to pass through.
- The Resident Coordinator must approve any travel to the affected areas from Port-au-Prince by road, which must be accompanied by an armed escort.
- Apart from the security concerns, there are no physical blockages on the roads from Port-au-Prince to the affected areas. The roads are now accessible to trucks as well as light vehicles.
- WFP is providing a daily barge service free-of-cost from Varreux to Jeremie. The road from Jeremie to Les Cayes is still not open so it is best accessed by helicopter.
- There is one United Nations Humanitarian Air Service (UNHAS) helicopter doing daily rotations to the affected areas. The Logistics Sector is taking requests for helicopter transport from humanitarian organisations.
- The United States is mobilising military assets from Honduras to Haiti, including 6-8 helicopters to be used for cargo. Two of these will likely be used for the humanitarian response, pending the approval of the Resident Coordinator.
- The latest infrastructural assessment is available on <u>log.ie</u>. Reports about infrastructural damages can be made through this platform.

2. Partner Updates

- On Tuesday the International Telecommunications Union (ITU) received a request for emergency telecommunications equipment from the Government of Haiti through CONATEL, the telecommunications regulatory agency. ITU has prepared a shipment of 20 satellite phones and 10 BGANs and is working with the Caribbean Disaster and Emergency Management Agency (CDEMA) on the quickest means to transport them to Haiti.
- UNICEF shared their updates with the ICT working group yesterday and will be able to provide more information as the continue to move into the affected areas.
- Télécoms Sans Frontières (TSF) has one staff member in Port-au-Prince, and another landing shortly from Mexico with a VSAT. The TSF team on ground have been integrated in discussions in coordination with UNDAC and OCHA, and are also in touch with Help.NGO in Les Cayes. TSF plans to send at least one person to Les Cayes where a sub-OSOCC is being set up rapidly with a GX terminal and some other equipment. There are at least nine Iridium sat phones with the team already and new sat phones arriving today.
- NetHope members are doing assessments, but access is difficult, so it is taking some time to get to the affected areas. A team has been identified and is on standby to deploy if and when there is a clear request for support. It was decided not to send an assessment due to the security situation.



MSB is sending an eight-person support team for the European Union Civil Protection team (EUCPT). The
team is expected to arrive in Port-au-Prince on 20 August at 13:30 local time. The team is bringing a VSAT
intended for the EUCPT team's use. The team plans to go into the impacted area with tents and generators
to do an assessment if the security situation permits.
