Operation overview

More than 7 million people across Adamawa, Borno and Yobe states in North-East Nigeria are in need of lifesaving assistance due to ongoing violence in the region. The ETS in Nigeria provides data connectivity to support humanitarian in assisting affected populations and security communications to support the safety and security of staff.

Communication needs in North-East Nigeria

Humanitarians work in unstable and insecure areas throughout North-East Nigeria. To assist the response community, the ETS provides reliable and effective means of communication to work, stay safe and communicate with colleagues. Across 10 common operational areas of the region – Bama, Banki, Damasak, Damaturu, Dikwa, Gwoza, Maiduguri, Monguno, Ngala and Yola – the ETS provides communication services to humanitarian workers from UN agencies and I/NGO partner organizations.

Services for humanitarians

Data connectivity — The ETS provides connectivity for 1,051 members of the response community in eight humanitarian hubs — Bama, Banki, Damasak, Dikwa, Gwoza, Maiduguri, Monguno and Ngala.

Security communications — The ETS provides security communications (radio) services in 10 common operational areas in support of UNDSS to keep staff in the field safe and secure. Radio services includes support to the 10 Security Operations Centres (SOCs), and radio programming.

Capacity building — The ETS delivers training sessions to enable humanitarians to learn about radio communications procedures to facilitate the humanitarian response on the ground.

Information Management — The ETS collects and analyses operational data and develops timely and accurate information products. These inform decision-making and coordination activities.

Strengthening coordination with partners — The ETS works closely with other UN agencies, as well as local and international non-governmental organizations (NGOs), to ensure an effective and coordinated response. Local ETS Working Group meetings are organized monthly.

Map the **communication needs of the affected population**, evaluate how the ETS can fulfill them **and implement** these projects.
